What is a sabbatical? and Why is Father Jack taking one?

A sabbatical is a spiritual discipline based on the biblical idea of the Sabbath day and the Sabbath year. It is a disciplined time of rest that deeply entrusts God with the business of managing the universe without us for a period of time. It is a discipline of trust and rest. That is the theology of the Sabbatical. The practice usually includes other disciplines like study, silence, pilgrimage and celebration.

The Diocese of Upper South Carolina has a formal policy on sabbaticals that has evolved over the past decade from strongly encouraging sabbaticals to requiring them in all letters of agreement between rectors and parishes. In that vein, Fr. Jack's letter of agreement with Grace Church requires a sabbatical within the next eighteen months. He will be able to combine his sabbatical with his annual vacation for a total of sixteen weeks. The sabbatical begins April 26th and ends August 15th, a time period that is relatively slower than the rest of the Church year.

What will Fr. Jack do while on sabbatical? The heart of his experience will be a formal pilgrimage on an ancient pilgrimage route. The Camino de Santiago de Compostela is a 500 mile path across northern Spain that Fr. Jack will be walking with his son, Ben over a six week period from May 29th to July 10th. This pilgrimage is laced with the history-laden tradition and discipline of being displaced and wandering with other pilgrims, and seeing what God gives along the way. In addition to the pilgrimage, Fr. Jack's sabbatical will consist of study, a silent retreat, and plenty of home time with his family.

In terms of the life of the parish, a sabbatical every five to seven years gives the priest and the congregation a chance to step back and consider how they want to go forward together. It encourages clergy to stay put, rather than to go looking for imaginary greener pastures. But primarily, it is a time of Sabbath and the unique blessings God has worked into that kind of time since the beginning of creation.

Our life as a parish will continue full speed ahead in Fr. Jack's absence; we will continue to worship together, to encourage each other and to care for each other. Sr. Warden Julie Bates and the vestry will act on Fr. Jack's behalf in making necessary day to day decisions and will be prepared no matter what occasion might arise. Fr. Tom Davis and Fr. David Bridgforth will be at Grace on Sundays while Fr. Jack is away. In case of a funeral while Fr. Jack is out of the country Mother Susan (Jack's wife) as well as Fr. Tom or Fr. David are available if needed. If Fr. Jack is in the country at the time of death or tragedy, he would of course be available, as always.

How should we respond to Fr. Jack's sabbatical? Pray for Fr. Jack and his family especially during the many weeks that they will be separated from one another. Pray for the vestry, especially Julie Bates, and support their leadership with your encouragement and consistent presence. Don't take a vacation away from Church. Sabbatical time is also a spiritual discipline for the Parish to become even more alive and more involved and more deeply in love with God.

Tip of the Verge !

The Etiquette of Worship

The courtesies expected during our Sunday morning worship is the topic of this month's column. I was discussing manners and courtesy with an 85-year old gentleman recently. He lamented that we seem to have skipped a generation (or two) of teaching – especially by example – the basic skills of good manners and common courtesy.

What does this have to do with Sunday morning worship at Grace Church, you might ask? Let's acknowledge why we go to church in the first place -- to worship and receive the grace of God.

In order to exhibit the respect due our acts of worship, it seems only natural to extend some courtesy to the liturgy itself. There are certain actions that take place during the service that have an elevated sense of importance and holiness to us. During those times, it would seem discourteous to be moving about or getting up and leaving the pews.

The ushers at church know without a doubt when it is appropriate for latecomers to enter the service and be seated. It is acceptable to enter and find a seat while the congregation is standing during the song of praise (page 356 in the Book of Common Prayer) or immediately following (never during) The Collect of the Day while the Lector is making his/her way to the lectern to read the first lesson. One should not move about while the Holy Scripture is being read. No one should enter or leave during the reading of the Gospel or during any actions accompanying that reading.

The Sermon follows the reading of the Gospel. At Grace Church, we are blessed by exceptionally good sermons that deserve our respect and attention. No parishioner should enter or leave the pew while the sermon is being preached.

If you are not in your seat by the time we affirm our faith by saying The Nicene Creed (page 358 in the BCP), you have missed most of the preparation of mind and heart for the receiving of The Holy Eucharist. If you have not been seated by this time, you might want to stay in the Narthex of the church and follow along until time to exchange The Peace (page 360 in the BCP). Then take a seat during announcement time.

One last thought – our younger parishioners (children) should certainly be able to make it for just over an hour without leaving during any part of the service for a potty break.

Emergencies being the exception, our rule of worship should include the honor due the liturgy – attention and respect. I think my elderly friend would agree.

Grace word of the month Confirmation

The Episcopal Church's theology of Confirmation has continued to evolve along with its understanding of baptism. Confirmation is no longer seen as the completion of Christian initiation, nor is Confirmation a prerequisite for receiving communion. Baptism is full initiation by water and the Holy Spirit into Christ's body the church (BCP, p. 298). Accordingly, Confirmation has been increasingly understood in terms of a mature, public reaffirmation of the Christian faith and the baptismal promises. Some dioceses, including our diocese, require that candidates for Confirmation be at least sixteen years old to insure that the candidates are making a mature and independent affirmation of their faith. Candidates may have individual presenters who will support them in their Christian life by prayer and example. It is not necessary that the presenters be members of the clergy. The candidates reaffirm their renunciation of evil, and renew their commitment to Jesus Christ. They reaffirm the promises made by them or for them at the time of baptism. Those present in the congregation promise to do all in their power to support the candidates in their life in Christ. The bishop leads the congregation in renewing the baptismal covenant. The Prayers for the Candidates from the baptismal liturgy may be used as the Prayers for the Candidates for Confirmation/Reception/Reaffirmation (BCP, p. 417). The bishop lays hands on each candidate for Confirmation. The BCP provides specific prayers to be said by the bishop for Confirmation, for Reception, and for Reaffirmation. The bishop may shake hands with those who are being received to welcome them into this communion, and the bishop may lay hands on them in blessing. The bishop may also bless those who reaffirm their baptismal vows.

The Bishop will visit Grace on October 3rd. If you are interested in confirmation, please contact Father Jack or Lyn Merchant. Classes for confirmation will begin in August.

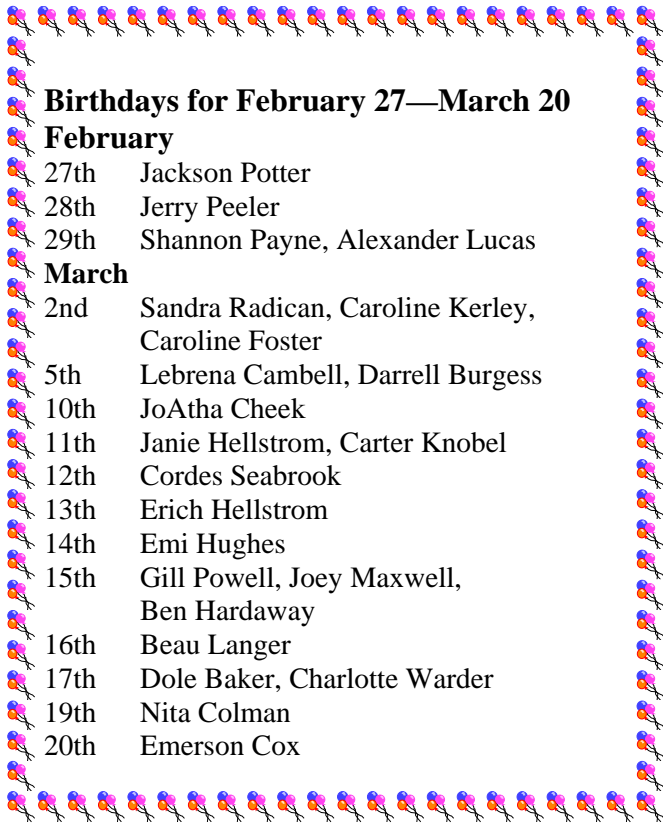
